


Woody's Games

Tag the Cat You'll need a stool and short piece of rope


Players stand in a circle. The "cat" (a dad) sits on a stool in the center. With him is a "keeper" (a Tree Climber). These two hold onto a piece of rope about two feet long. During play, they must not let go of the rope.

The other players try to dart in and tag the cat before the keeper tags them. If a player tags the cat, he becomes the cat, the cat becomes the keeper and the keeper joins the circle.

Woody's Hat Players sit in a circle. One person stands in the middle. He points to any other player and says, "Woody Raccoon can't find his hat and I think [He names the person he's pointing to.] hid it."

That player must deny the charge without speaking or smiling and point to someone else. This player also denies taking the hat by pointing to another person without speaking or smiling.

The first person to smile or talk becomes the person in the middle and starts the game over.





Paper Plate Pets

Have paper plates, scissors, colorful felt or construction paper, staplers, staples and glue ready.

1. Fold a paper plate in half and cut out a half moon shape along the fold. Make this hole wide enough for your fingers to fit inside. Cut the hole shallow now. You can make it deeper later so your puppet fits on your hand comfortably.





- 2. Fold another paper plate in half and staple it under the first one. Staple along the edges, (not the hole!)
- 3. Next, cut a piece of red construction paper or felt into the shape of a tongue. Glue the tongue near the center of the fold inside the plates. Make it long enough to hang out of the mouth.
- 4. Use your imagination to add eyes, ears, and even whiskers, feathers or scales to your pet.

Slip your hand into the pocket between the plates. Make the hole bigger if necessary.

5. When you are finished, slip your hand inside the pocket and have your pet talk to your friends.



Woody's Checkup

Spend time memorizing Psalm 119:11 and discussing these questions. Then, review previous verses.

- 3. What do you think happens when people follow God's Word obediently?



Woody's Stretch

Guess My Animal Write the names of different pets on small pieces of paper. Place the papers in a bowl, basket or bag.

Seat players in a circle. Pass the bowl around and ask everyone to take out one piece of paper. In turn, each player mimics the animal he chose. Other players try to guess the what kind of animal he's acting out.
